

## Conservation

Flowers, trees and shrubs are part of the park's natural heritage. Please do not damage or remove them.

## Wildlife

Park users should always be aware of bears and other wildlife. Never feed or approach them.

## Park Fees

**Fees are collected while campground is open, between May and the end of September.** Campers must be self-sufficient. Season dates and fees are subject to change, please check the website for current information.

**Check-in:** 1 p.m. for reservation holders; 7 a.m. to 10 p.m. for non-reservation holders. **Check-out:** 11 a.m. **Gates open** at 7 a.m. and **close** at 11 p.m.

## What You Should Know



There are 104 vehicle/tent campsites at this park. Campsite reservations are accepted and first-come, first-served sites are also available. For reservations call 1-800-689-9025 or [www.discovercamping.ca](http://www.discovercamping.ca). Maximum stay is 14 days. No electrical hookups are available.



There is a day-use parking area for approximately 105 vehicles. A picnic shelter and picnic tables are available at the day-use area. Picnicking in campsites is not permitted.



There is disabled access to the upper falls viewing area and picnic areas. Contact the Regional Office for more information.



Cold water is available for cooking and drinking. Taps are located throughout the park. Taps are shut off between October 15 and April 15.



There is one flush toilet building at the day-use parking lot and several pit toilets throughout the park and campground.



Firewood may be available for purchase. Campfire pits are provided. Group campfire facilities and/or limited burning hours may be designated at some campgrounds. Fire bans may be implemented during extremely hot weather conditions. Be prepared to bring a portable stove for cooking.



There are 3 kilometres of hiking/walking trails throughout the park for viewing the spectacular canyon and waterfalls. For your own safety and preservation of the park, obey posted signs and keep to designated trails. Shortcutting trails destroys plant life and soil structure.



Swimming is allowed in the river below the lower falls. Swimmers must exercise caution. There are no lifeguards on duty.



Bicycles are permitted on roadways and designated trails.



Pets/domestic animals must be on a leash at all times and are not allowed in swimming areas or park buildings. You are responsible for their behavior and must dispose of their excrement.

## Special Notes

Please take valuables with you when leaving your vehicle or lock them in a secure location when leaving your campsite. All losses should be reported to the RCMP and park staff.

Riverbanks can be very slippery. Stay away from cliff and riverbank edges. Sections of this river contain waterfalls, strong currents and other hazards. Jumping from bridges or cliffs is prohibited.

Alcohol consumption is permitted only within the boundaries of campsites with registered occupants of legal age.

Excessive noise, loud music, alcohol and parties are prohibited in the day-use area and campground.

# Englishman River Falls

## PROVINCIAL PARK



Welcome to Englishman River Falls Provincial Park. Located 13 kilometres southwest of Parksville off Hwy 4 toward Port Alberni, this 97-hectare park sits along the Englishman River. It contains two beautiful waterfalls which cascade along the river bed. There is a spectacular canyon between the two falls. At the lower falls, there is a swimming hole with a small rocky beach area to sunbathe. This park contains several trails which meander through the old-growth forest and along the river. Swim in the river or take the short drive to the Parksville-Qualicum area to laze about on the sandy ocean beaches.
